This event opens a space for the USF community to reflect on and discuss the personal and political impact of the inauguration of the Trump Presidency and its intersection with underlying hierarchies based on race, nationality, gender, class, ableism, religion, status, and sexuality. Linked presentations, discussions, and activities will focus on building solidaristic strategies to confront an expected upsurge and entrenchment of state and social forms of discrimination and repression.

This session will explore the personal and political impact of the recent inauguration. Participants will then discuss their visions for hope, resistance and change in community.

This session asks us to consider how our struggles are intertwined and how the road towards progressive liberation rests on an intersectional understanding of oppression. What examples of social movements are already engaged in this work that we can learn from and contribute to? How can we work together through the real challenges to durable allyship and solidarity for the long run?
